

#### THRESHOLD NEWS

On Monday, October 23, students in the MeANS Threshold program went on one of two field trips as part of this year's programmatic theme: "Exploring and Experiencing our Communities".

One group of students visited Belfast Area High School to learn about the kelp farm that students there have started. Our students helped to transfer kelp spores onto spools, which will be later transplanted into the Belfast Harbor, to be harvested next summer. The kelp farm was started as part of Belfast High School's Marine Institute, which seeks to engage Maine youth in ocean sciences and related careers. Afterwards, students visited Mosman park to enjoy the beach, and to look for any kelp laden with spores



that may have been left behind by the tide.

The other group enjoyed a warm and muddy mile walk up Mt. Battie at Camden Hills state park. Due to the rains, the trail was wet and roots were slippery, but we were surrounded by the elegance of the Maine Fall Forest Floor. Maple leaves, Oak leaves, Birch Leaves, Ash Leaves all covered our trail. For some this walk was challenging, others took the hill with ease. Everyone made it to the top! From the top we saw the view that once inspired a 19 year old Edna St. Vincent Millay to write her famous poem "Renascence":

All I could see from where I stood
Was three long mountains and a wood;
I turned and looked another way,
And saw three islands in a bay.

Once at the top students enjoyed the same view of Penobscot Bay while eating their lunch.
