



Threshold News

In Search of: Laptops and Chargers

Maine Big Night is a statewide community science project to gather data and help save Maine's amphibian populations. Every spring, frogs, toads, and salamanders emerge on the first rainy nights after the thaw and begin a harrowing mass migration toward their vernal pools, the seasonal wetlands where they themselves hatched. Unfortunately for the amphibians, roads and human developments now criss-cross and fragment their habitat, and road mortality is often extremely high.



That's where Maine Big Night volunteers come in. Armed with headlamps and safety vests, they adopt stretches of road along wetland areas, and serve as crossing guards and observers, identifying and documenting species. To qualify as volunteers, students in the MeANS Threshold Program studied the MBN handbook and passed the certification test covering safety procedures, identifying characteristics of different species, and safe amphibian handling techniques, along with the data collection and submission process. Our students and some of their family members braved the cold drizzle late into the night to save quite a few Spring Peepers, Wood Frogs, Green Frogs, Leopard Frogs, Spotted Salamanders,

and even a Red Eft!

The data we collected will also help guide conservation efforts by identifying population density and migration patterns so that we can help reduce the impact of human infrastructure and ensure the survival of these vital members of our ecosystem!

April's RINGER




The Ringer is a monthly award given to faculty and staff at the Maine Academy of Natural Sciences. It represents the individual's outstanding commitment to student growth.
